RECEPTION OF THE BODY

The reception of the body usually takes place on the evening before the Funeral Mass. The community gathers to pray for the deceased and to support you the bereaved. The body is received by the priest at the entrance to the church and is blessed with holy water. The family follows into the church and an opening prayer is said



The Pall is a white cloth, which is a symbol of Baptism may be placed on the coffin by family members or friends.



A Bible is also placed on the coffin to remind us that Christians are called to live by the Word of God.



The Paschal Candle is lit to remind us that Christ is our light.



Flowers: Family flowers may be placed on a table near the coffin



Scripture Readings: A reading from Scripture, a psalm and prayers will be read by the priest or by a member of the Funeral Ministry Team



Rosary: A decade of the Rosary will be recited by the priest or by a member of the Funeral Ministry Team.



Eulogy Before the concluding rite, a few words or short eulogy may be given by a family member to the congregation who has gathered in sympathy with them.

THE FUNERAL MASS

The priest or a member of the Parish Funeral Team will discuss the funeral Mass with designated member/members of the family.

Readings: The Family is invited to choose Readings from the funeral Booklet which will be given to them. The first reading is usually chosen from the Old Testament and the second reading from the New Testament. The Responsorial Psalm comes after the first reading. If there is a singer, the Responsorial Psalm will be sung. A member of the Funeral Ministry Team will be available to help organize the liturgy.

Homily: A homily will be given by the priest. There is no eulogy during the Mass.

Prayer of the Faithful: The family decides on suitable prayers. There are samples at back of Funeral Booklet.

Music and Singing: In keeping with the dignity of the funeral Mass celebrated in Church only sacred hymns and music should be chosen.

Photograph and appropriate memorabilia: A photograph and appropriate memorabilia can be placed on a small table close to the coffin or they may be carried in the Entrance Procession.

Offertory Procession: The bread and the wine are brought to the altar by members of the family.

The Pall is taken off the coffin by family members at the end of Mass

Final prayers: After the final prayers of commendation the family follow the coffin out of the church as the final hymn is sung.

Old Testament Readings

Reading 1.

A reading from the Book of Wisdom (3: 1-6.9)

The souls of the virtuous are in the hands of God, no torment shall ever touch them. In the eyes of the unwise, they did appear to die, their going looked like a disaster, their leaving us, like annihilation; but they are in peace.

If they experienced punishment as men see it, their hope was rich with immortality; slight was their affliction, great will their blessing be.

God has put them to the test and proved them worthy to be with Him.

He has tested them like gold in a furnace, and accepted them as a holocaust.

They who trust in Him will understand the truth, those who are faithful will live with Him in love; for grace and mercy await those He has chosen.

Reading 2.

A reading from the Book of Wisdom (4: 7-15)

The virtuous man, though he dies before his time, will find rest.

Length of days is not what makes age honourable nor numbers of years the true measure of life: understanding, this is man's grey hairs, untarnished life, this is ripe old age.

He has sought to please God, so God has loved him; as he was living among sinners, he has been taken up.

He has been carried off so that evil may not warp his understanding or treachery seduce his soul; for the fascination of evil throws good things into the shade, and the whirlwind of desire corrupts a simple heart.

Coming to perfection in so short a while, he achieved long life, his soul being pleasing to the Lord, he has taken him quickly from the wickedness around him.

Yet people look on uncomprehending; it does not enter their heads that grace and mercy await the chosen of the Lord, and protection, his holy ones.

Reading 3

A reading from the prophet Isaiah (25: 6-9)

On this mountain, the Lord of hosts will prepare for all peoples a banquet of rich foods.

On this mountain he will remove the mourning veil covering all peoples, and the shroud enwrapping all nations, he will destroy death forever.

The Lord will wipe away the tears from every cheek; He will take away his people's shame everywhere on earth for the Lord has said so.

That day, it will be said; See, this is our God in whom we hoped for salvation:

The Lord is the one in whom we hoped.

We exult and we rejoice that he has saved us.

Reading 4.

A reading from the book of Sirach (2: 1-9)

When you come to serve the Lord, prepare yourself for testing. Set your heart right and be steadfast, and do not be impetuous in time of calamity. Cling to Him, and do not depart, so that your last days shall be prosperous.

Accept whatever befalls you, and in times of humiliation be patient. For gold is tested in the fire, and those found acceptable, in the furnace of humiliation. Trust in Him, and He will help you; make your ways straight, and hope in Him

You who fear the Lord, wait for His mercy; do not stray, or else you may fail. You who fear the Lord, trust in Him, and your reward will not be lost. You who fear the Lord, hope for good things, for lasting joy and mercy.

A reading from the book of Ecclesiastes

New Testament Readings

READING 1

A reading from the letter of St. Paul to the Romans (6: 3-4, 8-9.)

When we were baptised in Christ Jesus we were baptised in His death; in other words, when we were baptised we went into the tomb with Him and joined Him in death, so that as Christ was raised from the dead by the Father's glory, we too might live a new life.

But we believe that having died with Christ we shall return to life with Him: Christ, as we know, having been raised from the dead will never die again. Death has no power over Him any more.



A reading from the letter of St. Paul to the Romans. (8: 31-35, 37-39)

With God on our side who can be against us? Since God did not spare His own Son, but gave Him up to benefit us all, we may be certain, after such a gift, that He will not refuse anything that He can give. Could anyone accuse those that God has chosen? When God acquits, could anyone condemn? Could Christ Jesus? No! He not only died for us – He rose from the dead, and there at God's right hand He stands and pleads for us.

Nothing therefore can come between us and the love of Christ, even if we are troubled or worried, or being persecuted, or lacking food or clothes, or being threatened or even attacked. These are the trials through which we triumph, by the power of Him who loves us.

For I am certain of this: neither death nor life, no angel, no prince, nothing exists, nothing still to come, nor any power, or height or depth, nor any created thing, can ever come between us and the love of God made visible in Christ Jesus our Lord.

A reading from the letter of St. Paul to the Romans.

(14:7-12)

The life and death of each of us has its influence on others; if we live, we live for the Lord; and if we die, we die for the Lord, so that alive or dead we belong to the Lord. This explains why Christ both died and came to life, it was so that He might be Lord both of the dead and of the living. We shall all have to stand before the judgement seat of God; as scripture says: By my life – it is the Lord who speaks – every knee shall bend before Me, and every tongue shall praise God. It is to God, therefore, that each of us must give an account of himself

The word of the Lord.

READING 4

A reading from the first letter of St. Paul to the Corinthians. (15: 20-23)

Christ has been raised from the dead, the first-fruits of all who have fallen asleep. Death came through one man and in the same way the resurrection of the dead has come through one man. Just as all men die in Adam, so all men will be brought to life in Christ, but all of them in their proper order: Christ as the first-fruits and then, after the coming of Christ, those who belong to Him.

A reading from the first letter of St. Paul to the Corinthians (15: 51-57)

I will tell you something that has been kept secret: that we are not all going to die, but we shall all be changed. This will be instantaneous, in the twinkling of an eye, when the last trumpet sounds. It will sound, and the dead will be raised, imperishable, and we hall be changed as well, because our present perishable nature must put on imperishability and this mortal nature must put on immortality

When this perishable nature has put on imperishability, and when this mortal nature has put on immortality, then the words of scripture will come true: Death is swallowed up in victory. Death, where is your victory? Death, where is your sting? Now the sting of death is sin, and sin gets its power from the Law. So let us thank God for giving us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ.

A reading from the second letter of St. Paul to the Corinthians (5: 1.6-10)

We know that when the tent we live in on earth is folded up, there is a house built by God for us, an everlasting home not made by human hands, in the heavens.

We are always full of confidence, then, when we remember that to live in the body means to be exiled from the Lord, going as we do by faith and not by sight - we are full of confidence. I say, and actually want to be exiled from the body and make our home with the Lord.

Whether we are living in the body or exiled from it, we are intent on pleasing Him. For all the truth about us will be brought out in the court of Christ, and each of us will get what he deserves for the things he did in the body, good or bad.

This is the word of the Lord.

A reading from the first letter of St. Paul to the Thessalonians (4: 13-18)

We want you to be quite certain, brothers and sisters, about those who have died, to make sure that you do not grieve about them, like the other people that have no hope. We believe that Jesus died and rose again, and that it will be the same for those who have died in Jesus: God will bring them with Him. We can tell you this from the Lord's own teaching, and any of us who are left alive until the Lord's coming will not have any advantage over those who have died

At the trumpet of God, the voice of the archangel will call out the command and the Lord Himself will come down from heaven; those who died in Christ will be the first to rise, and then those of us who are still alive will be taken up in the clouds, together with them, to meet the Lord in the air. So we shall stay with the Lord forever.

With such thoughts are these you can comfort one another.

A reading of the letter of St. Paul to the Philippians (3: 20-21)

For us, our homeland is in heaven, and from heaven comes the Saviour we are waiting for, the Lord Jesus Christ, and He will transfigure those wretched bodies of ours into copies of His glorious body. He will do that by the same power with which He can subdue the whole universe

The word of the Lord.

READING 9

A reading from the first letter of St. John (3: 1-2)

Think of the love that the Father has lavished on us by letting us be called God's children, and that is what we are.

Because the world refused to acknowledge Him, therefore it does not acknowledge us.

My dear people, we are already the children of God but what we are to be in the future has not yet been revealed; all we know is that when it is revealed we shall be like Him because we shall see Him as He really is.
