

A Turnaround

In this Sunday's first reading we hear Saint Peter announce to his listeners:

The whole House of Israel can be certain that God has made this Jesus whom you crucified both Lord and Christ. (Acts 2:36)



Saint Peter did not make them feel bad, but instead showed them mercy, telling them that they must ask for forgiveness from God, and that by doing so they would receive the gift of the Holy Spirit.

False Prophets, False Security

Just as Saint Peter called these men and women to repentance, God calls each one of us to be true followers of Christ. In the gospel, Jesus warns us that there are many false prophets who claim to represent God's voice, but in reality they are only ...

thieves and brigands that come to steal and destroy.

(John 10:10)

They do not represent God, nor do they preach the word of God, only an empty philosophy that gives a false sense of security. Typically, they deny both the reality of sin and the need to repent and be forgiven.

Joy and Peace

Precisely because they do not fundamentally challenge us , it is easy to listen to these false prophets ... they reassure us that we are fine the way we are. On the other hand, the voice of the Lord cuts more finely than a two-edged sword, a voice that judges our secret thoughts and emotions.

To accept the word of God is someting truly difficult, but it is full of hope, mercy and compassion. When the men and women of Israel repented they were filled with the gifts of the Holy Spirit and experienced great joy and peace in their lives.

Christ promised that if we listen to his voice and enter through the gate that is Christ himself, then we can be assured of the green pastures of eternal life.



Summary

The word "repent" means "to turn away from"; it implies a new way of life different from our former one.

These were men and women who had sided with the Jewish authorities when they executed Jesus Christ as a blasphemer.

Question

Who today denies the reality of sin and the need to be forgiven by Christ?

Prayer

Lord, may I have the courage to repent and ask for forgiveness.

SUNDAY LETTER

Series: Morality; Fourth Sunday of Easter Year A; 30 Apr 2023

Ever since the arrival of modern media, we have been surrounded by a barrage of competing voices, each trying to grab our attention. Whether we listen to the radio, pick up a newspaper, watch television or glance at our computer or phone, there is always somebody either selling us something or trying to convince us of their view of the world. We feel social pressure

to conform to these prevailing world-views.
However, the call of Jesus makes us turn away from the world's dominant voices, even when we find it hard to stand up for ourselves and disagree with these widespread worldviews.
We risk encountering opposition and scorn.



Life's Vocation

When, over two thousand years ago, Christ began to preach, his first message was:

Repent, and believe the Gospel.

(Mk 1:15)

The word "repent" means "to turn away from", so it automatically implies a new way of life, one that is different from a former life. But it's not always easy to hear the voice of God and make the necessary changes to our lives. That is because the voice of God is challenging, and that's why the Psalmist warns us,

O that today you would listen to His voice, harden not your hearts. (Psalm 94)

When we hear God's voice in our conscience, we can either harden our hearts and ignore it, or we can choose to listen, to accept it, and to change our ways.
