Season Of Creation 2023 Resources (Message from Bishop Martin Hayes:)

In recent days, Met Eireann released statistics to say that the past month of June was the warmest June in 83 years. We are being impacted by global warming which is having a particular effect on Europe.

We may feel overwhelmed by these scientific facts and that we can do nothing to reverse this global trend of rising temperatures. However, as individual Christians and as parish communities we take actions to address the impact of the current climate crisis. The Laudato Si' Working Group and Animators have prepared two sets of resources (see https://www.catholicbishops.ie/laudato-si/); firstly, to return 30% of our parish grounds to nature and secondly, those for the 2023 Season of Creation (1st Sept – 4th Oct) in accord with the theme of 'let justice and peace flow'.

In his message for the 2023 Season of Creation, Pope Francis highlights our interconnectedness with God, with each other, with ourselves and with all of creation. These resources offer the opportunity for parishes to pray, discuss and take practical actions to address global warming at a local level. Our little actions together can have a global impact for the future of our Common Home.

Violence on TV

Neglecting our other faculties costs us dearly. If we neglect the mind to the same degree that we neglect the other faculties, we would be called barbarians. But we tolerate, we even cultivate, a barbarism of feeling and will. Look at the depravity that is frequently held up before us in the entertainment industry. Is it not barbarism?

Children Taken Apart

If we neglect our feelings and our will, we will never learn to love; we will learn only a caricature of love: greed. To love is to respect, to care about. Its deepest meaning is "to become one with" someone. The word "analysis" means just about the opposite: "to take apart".

Sometimes, unintentionally, our education system "takes apart" something that children are born with, and we give them instead whatever it takes for them to fit into society, leaving many as damaged as the society itself.

Keep it Simple

It was only when the towns of Chorazin, Bethsaida and Capernaum had rejected Jesus that he exclaimed,

I thank you, Father, Lord of heaven and earth, because you have hidden these things from the wise and intelligent, and have revealed them to infants. (Mt 11:25)

Perhaps there were many intelligent people in those towns, but Jesus was tired of arguing with them. Their intelligence left no mark on the history of the world. Of Chorazin and Bethsaida there is no trace left; Capernaum is only a couple of ruins. But the extraordinary love that Jesus embodied will never be forgotten.

Summary

If we neglect our feelings and will, we will never learn to love.

SUNDAY LETTER

Series: Spirituality; Fourteenth Sunday of Year A; 9 Jul 2023

The French mystic, Madame Guyon (1648-1717) wrote,

"Through being given a rule and method on how to love God, people have in great measure been estranged from God. How unnecessary it is to teach an art of loving! The language of love, though natural to the lover, is nonsense and barbarism to one who does not love. The best way to learn the love of God is to love God.

The ignorant and simple, because they proceed with more heart and greater simplicity, often become better at it. The Spirit of God needs none of our arrangements and methods: when it pleases him, he turns shepherds into prophets. And so, far from excluding anyone from the Temple of Prayer, he throws wide the gates that all may enter, while Wisdom cries aloud in the streets:

'You that are simple turn in here' (Proverbs 9:4)."



LOVE IS SIMPLE

When I was in Iceland some years ago I asked an 8-year-old American girl how long it took her to learn the Icelandic language (she was the best in her family at it). She replied, "A day, or two days ... or a week." In other words she didn't think about it at all; she just played with her Icelandic friends. Children learn spontaneously, but adults proceed "by rule and method." Because we have lost the capacity for direct experience, we need handbooks for everything. While an adult stands back to analyse something, a child just becomes one with it.

Unreal Gifts

We have so venerated the analytical mind that our other faculties are scarcely taken into account. I have known people who were intellectually gifted but incapable of looking after themselves, or anyone else for that matter. Far from seeing this as an embarrassment, we almost make it a badge of honour: we may laugh at the absentminded professor, but secretly we revere him. However, as Chesterton said, "A madman is not someone who has lost his mind; he is someone who has lost everything except his mind."
