#### **Crucified With Christ**

An essential part of becoming a true follower of Christ is to conform our lives to his life, and ultimately to say with Saint Paul that ...

I have been crucified with Christ; it is no longer I who live but Christ who lives in me.

Our journey to personal holiness, and eventually to eternal life, must take the same path that Christ took. Jesus tells us that ...

Whoever wants to be my disciple must deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. (Luke 9:23)

Jesus Christ loved all the people he met, even those who rejected him. Perhaps his greatest act of love was to forgive those who, out of envy and jealousy, had put him to death on the cross.

#### The Place of Suffering and Evil

As Christians, we too are called to imitate Christ, to love our enemies and to forgive those who hurt us. In fact, very often, Jesus Christ uses the suffering and evil we experience to transform us and make us more like himself. In this way, the crosses that we carry are our means of sanctification. Saint Peter understood this profoundly when he said:

This is a cause of great joy for you, even though you may for a short time have to bear being plagued by all sorts of trials so that when Jesus Christ is revealed, your faith will have been tested and proved like gold – only it is more precious than gold which is corruptible even though it bears testing by fire – and then you will have praise and glory and honour. (1 Pet 1:6-7)

#### **Bringing All to Salvation**

The value of innocent suffering is a mystery which will only be fully understood in the next life. However, we know that Christ was innocent, and that his suffering and love redeemed the whole world.

When we participate in Christ's suffering, God uses it to save us and to bring others to salvation also. For the moment, we must accept these mysteries on the basis of faith, until the wisdom of God is fully revealed to us. Then we will truly acknowledge that ...

He has done all things well.

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Series: Morality; Sixteenth Sunday of Year A; 23 Jul 2023

When the subject of God arises in conversation, one of the questions people often ask is: "If God exists, why is there so much suffering and evil in the world?" Indeed, many people justify their lack of belief in God on the basis that this question cannot be satisfactorily answered.

If God is good, loving, and all-powerful, then why has he not eliminated sin and death from the world? Why do innocent human beings (such as babies) suffer disease?

Why do believers who have received the gift of the Holy Spirit at Baptism frequently endure persecution, violence, and martyrdom? Have they not been 'saved' by Christ's sacrifice on the Cross?



# **INNOCENT SUFFERING**

A clue to answering the question of innocent suffering, and the problem of evil in general, is given in this Sunday's gospel. By means of the parable of the wheat and the darnel, the Lord makes it clear that he did not intend to do away with evil immediately ... he allows it to be part of our human condition for the moment, until the time comes for him to return in glory at the end of time, and to defeat evil definitively. Why is this so?

#### **Good From Evil**

Saint Thomas Aquinas said that God would only ever allow evil to exist if he could somehow draw goodness from it. This is reflected in the command Christ gave to his disciples. He said:

Love your enemies, and pray for those who persecute you, that you may be sons of your Father in heaven, for He causes His sun to rise on the evil and the good, and sends rain on the righteous and the unrighteous. If you love those who love you, what reward will you get? Do not even tax collectors do the same? (Matt 5:44-46)
