Led by: Fr Laurence Gallagher, C.Ss.R Jesus saw this as a sign from the Father that Peter would be the one to lead his Church into the future, a man who would lead the people in believing this most essential truth: that Jesus of Nazareth was the Messiah, the Son of the living God.

Leadership in Humility

In Jerusalem, many centuries before this, on a cliff overlooking the Kedron Valley, Shebna, the royal stewart to King Hezekiah, carved a fine tomb for himself which can still be seen today. Shebna held the key of the royal palace, and so he controlled everything under the king himself. This tomb was so grandiose that it got Shebna fired. God wanted a more humble man to hold those keys.

Jesus, the "King of kings," then chose a fisherman, and gave him the keys. And the keys of this kingdom were not those of the tiny kingdom of Judah. These were the keys of the Kingdom of Heaven.

Following the Spirit


We read in *The Acts of the Apostles* that as soon as Jesus ascended into heaven, Peter was the one to take over leadership of the community. In the power of the Holy Spirit, Peter personally directed the newborn Church and opened it up to the nations as a universal, truly "catholic", Church. Every New Testament author, Matthew, Mark, Luke, John and Paul, all singled out Peter as standing at the foundation of everything else.

Apostolic Succession

Four centuries later, Pope Leo the Great sent a letter to the bishops gathered in the Greek city of Chalcedon to discuss the Christian belief in Jesus. And when they read this remarkable letter, the bishops shouted together, "Peter has spoken through Leo!"

The power of the keys did not die with Peter, but is still alive in the Church today, such that the Church of today is united under the successor of Peter, in the same faith that inspired Peter to say:

"You are the Christ, the Son of the living God."

Lord, help me to believe in you in the way that St Peter did.



"Some say you are John the Baptist, others say Elijah, and others Jeremiah or one of the prophets." (Matt 16:14) Then he turned the question around:

You: who do you say I am? (Matt 16:15)

Series: The Church; Twenty-First Sunday of Year A; 27 Aug 2023

Jesus had raised more questions than he had given answers. How can a man who looks like any other man, a carpenter from Nazareth, work miracles, signs, wonders, and preach with such authority as he did? To speak about him was to speak about themselves, about how they dealt with this man who was at once so ordinary, and yet so wonderful. Who would dare answer the question?

Not Flesh and Blood

Peter dared, and from the depths of grace in his mind, he spoke,

You are the Christ, the Son of the living God. (Mt 16:16) Seeing his faith, Jesus knew that in Peter, God had spoken, and so he said to Peter,

It was not flesh and blood which told you this, but my Father who is in heaven. (Matt 16:16)
