Face the Problem Squarely

As Christians, whenever we feel wronged, we should be prepared to 'have it out with others, precisely because we love them and would want them to do the same for us. As St Paul reminds us:

Avoid getting into debt, except the debt of mutual love ... Love is the one thing that cannot hurt your neighbour; that is why it is the answer to every one of the commandments. (Rom 13:10)

The Role of the Community

The Christian community is a community of people whose sins have been forgiven by God, and who should, consequently, bear witness to this. Every Christian has a responsibility for their fellow Christian's salvation. He or she must bring others back to the way of salvation ... with the personal touch, or even a discrete approach.

Community with God

God draws us into communion with himself. Despite our sins, he does not push us away. In his boundless forgiveness and compassion, we have, in Christ, the example we are asked to live by. Christ's teaching is about keeping the community of the Church united, living in true peace (and not just the absence of conflict).

True Christian living is deeper than superficial niceness, something that can be a cover for indifference, dishonesty and even cruelty.

We must pray, gently and persistently, for sinners, including ourselves, that all may repent. ■

Summary

Our aim is not to humiliate others, but rather to get beyond the offending remarks and enquire into the motives behind these actions, to seek the truth of the matter.

Social media works in two ways. On the one hand, it can be a place for genuine sharing of ideas and deep discussion. However, as we are well aware, it can also descend into a platform for shaming and humiliating others. Faced with someone of a different view, the response can be one of ridicule and exclusion, pushing others into obscurity.

Conflict, tensions, misunderstandings and wrongs are common among people who live or work together. However, the teaching of Christ runs counter to the trend in modern society where the offended is not the one who should make the first move, but rather the offender. "I am entitled to an apology"; "I was wronged by you"; the onus is on you to make the first move, not me". But this is not Christ's

Resolving Conflict



In this Sunday's gospel Christ is quite clear that our first response, when someone has wronged us, is not to push the other away, but to draw them closer, to reason with them, to engage with them, to have a conversation with them ... even if the problem may have started with malicious gossip or some silly misunderstanding.

The Starting Point

If the other person is genuinely in the wrong, we must try to convince them of this and show them what the wrong is. Only if this does not work does Christ tell us to bring others into the conversation. Throughout this process one's default position is always one of charitable engagement. The aim is not to humiliate someone in the presence of others, but rather to get beyond the face of the offending actions, and to enquire more deeply into the motives behind these actions ... to seek the truth of the matter. It involves walking the extra mile, and of not giving in to premature judgement.
