

Biblical Revelation

In this Sunday's second reading St Paul tells us that he is capable of putting up with whatever life might throw at him. He has God on his side, and thus he has the courage to face life head on. For St Paul, 'having Christ' makes his life worth living. As he says in his *Letter to the Romans*:

If God is for us, who can be against us. (Rom 8:31)

The image of marriage is the one image that appears repeatedly in the Bible ... from the opening of the *Book of Genesis* to the final *Book of the Apocalypse*.

The Bible opens with the marriage of Adam and Eve and ends with the marriage of the Lamb to the heavenly Jerusalem. God is inviting us into a loving, life-giving relationship.

This invitation gives St Paul the courage to face all that life throws at him: wild beasts, floggings, shipwreck, even expulsion from the synagogue. Everything he had held as important he threw away once he had met Christ and had come to accept what Christ was offering. For him, Christ was everything. Christ is the marriage covenant offered by God; Christ is the heavenly banquet.

Life After Death

The first reading this Sunday is often used in funeral liturgies as a way of expressing our Christian hope of what life will be like in heaven. For us Christians, life doesn't end in death and the silence of the tomb, because Jesus has opened to us a whole new way of being, a place of joy and peace, a place of fulfilment and happiness. It is the ultimate gift offered to the human race as it faces the inevitable question of death.

Death is Not Silent

Is the coffin all I have to look forward to? Is my life to be summed up in a dark grave? The Christian sings out: NO!

And yet so many of our contemporaries seem content to settle for the hopelessness of the grave and the silence of death. It seems strange to us that those invited refused the offer of a banquet. But sadly, that is the response of the secular world to the question of death. They prefer the darkness of life without Christ, rather than accept the offer of life in Christ.

This offer is no small offer, it is the choice between life and absurdity. In his writings, CS Lewis challenged us not to settle for mediocrity, the choice of the modern secular vision of life. We are called to something greater.



Summary

Christ offers us a hope that far exceeds the categories of this world.

For St Paul, having Christ in his life makes life worth living.


