Blessed Margaret Ball - Feast Day 30th January.




Born Margaret Bermingham about 1515 in Skreen, Co Meath, she married Bartholomew Ball, a prosperous Dublin merchant, where she came to live. Her eldest son, Walter, yielding to the pressure of the times, became a Protestant and an opponent of the Catholic faith. Margaret continued to provide 'safe houses' for bishops and priests passing through Dublin and would invite Walter to dine with them, hoping for his reconversion to Catholicism.

But Walter was not for turning. When he was elected Mayor of Dublin, he had his own mother arrested and drawn through the streets, on a wooden hurdle, as she could no longer walk, to Dublin Castle. Here she remained imprisoned for the rest of her life. If she had renounced her faith she could have returned home, but

she refused and died in prison aged 70 in 1584. The chapel-of-ease, called Blessed Margaret Ball Church, built in the 1980s on the Coolock Road at Santry in Larkhill parish, Dublin, was named in her honour.

Presentation Of the Day)

On this day there is a great tradition of getting a candle blessed and keeping it in the homes for prayer and in the event of sickness or death having one to hand. Some of these candles are used on the feast of St Blaise for the "Blessing of the throat".

St Blaise -Saturday 3rd February

"Through the intercession of St Blaise, bishop and martyr, may the Lord deliver you from all ailments of the throat and every other illness" is the traditional prayer

of blessing using the candles blessed from the day before. Throats will be blessed after the 10.00am mass on Saturday morning.

The terminally-ill teenager, Donal Walsh, touched the hearts of the nation with the strength of his deep faith, the power and challenge of his clarion call to seek help when tempted to commit suicide, and his amazing courage as he faced death, saying, 'I am not afraid, but nervous.'

Speaking Against Injustice

We are called to be prophets, to speak out against injustice, discrimination and prejudice, to act with integrity, tolerance and courage, making real and credible the mandate of Jesus to: "Love one another, as I have loved you."

At his installation as Archbishop of Dublin, bishop Dermot Farrell spoke some prophetic words:

"Faith is not an invitation to put up with life's difficulties and frustrations. Rather, faith asks us to see these as a time of grace – this very time with its frustrations and fear, is rich with possibilities, already carrying the future, overflowing with Christ." (+Demot Farrell, 2nd Feb 2021)

"I will raise up for you a prophet like myself from among yourselves." (DLE:15)


The task of leading the People of Israel from the slavery of Egypt and into the freedom of the Promised Land was fraught with conflict, grumbling and quarrelling. Throughout that forty-year trek through the desert, the prophetic voice of Moses constantly reminded the Chosen People of God's covenant, his "love agreement",

"You shall be my people and I will be your God." (Jer 32:38)

In the spirit of Psalm 94 we can imagine Moses pleading on many occasions:

"Listen to his voice! Harden not your hearts." (Psalm 94:8)

Moses' Prophecy



There were, no doubt, times when Moses must have felt frustrated and discouraged; times when his faith in God was challenged. But he persevered with his prophetic mission. A prophet is God's spokesperson, one called and sent to proclaim the word of God. The call is a powerful summons; the task is challenging and formidable.

Over many years we have heard the prophetic voice of Pope Francis constantly challenging, encouraging, chiding, forgiving, discerning, pleading, raising issues of international concern, and focusing on his deep concern about global warming and the destruction of planet earth.
