Purpose in the Drudgery

Amidst his trials, Job experienced profound sorrow. The difference between Job and a Christian believer is that Jesus Christ has revealed the place of suffering in human life. Christ has transformed the drudgery of life - its sufferings and tedium - by revealing the purpose of that suffering. On the Cross, Christ transformed the dilemma of human suffering: he converted human suffering into life-giving grace.

As Christians we offer our suffering in union with the suffering of Christ. This reality gives Christians a tremendous sense of purpose, even in the worst of afflictions. It is the difference between suffering "with despair" and "suffering with faith, hope and love". The smallest suffering offered to God with love is a source of great grace for the Church and for the world.

A Modern-Day Job

The testimony of Colleen Willard has gone viral on YouTube. She had been diagnosed with over 20 illnesses. Like Job, her world was shattered. Tempted to despair, she turned to the rosary. It was in praying the rosary that she discovered the strength to offer her suffering in Christ. For her, this transformed her whole attitude.

However, like Job, God not only healed her of all her illnesses, he blessed her with graces beyond telling. In hindsight she saw in her unbearable suffering the wisdom of God at work. It is true, however, that many won't experience Job's or Colleen's miracle and restoration in this life. It will be from the vantage-point of etemity that we will see how the drudgery of life leads to a weight of glory beyond all telling.



Summary

It is from the vantagepoint of eternity that we will see how the drudgery of life leads to a weight of glory beyond all telling. On the Cross, Christ transformed the dilemma of human suffering; he converted human suffering into a means of life-giving grace.


Series: Morality; Fifth Sunday of Year B; 4 February 2024 "Is not man's life on earth a drudgery?" (Job 7:1) This is lob's

question! In the chaos of his life, when he was steeped in the suffering of great personal loss, Job could not find a glimmer of hope. Job's experience is the experience of many who are facing unbearable anguish. In such anguish, many questions arise:

Does God care? Does God exist? Is there any purpose to my suffering? It is good for us to remember that through his suffering, Job eventually experienced a theophany - an understanding of God's presence to him.

JOB'S DILEMMA

SUNDAY



God appeared to Job in his pain. On seeing God, Job's dilemma was solved. In one glimpse of God, Job understood everything. He repented of his questioning, and surrendered to the divine wisdom he saw in the vision of God. He came to a fresh understanding, not by arguments, but by knowing God. The same is true for us in our pain.

Rather than asking questions that we cannot answer, we turn instead to God in prayer. God slowly comforts us and helps us surrender to what we do not understand. It is in prayer that God's wisdom makes sense of the situation. It is in prayer that we come to know God as good and faithful. Whatever God shows us, ultimately, in humility, we are called to trust.
