of the Bible. It occurred at the beginning of the 6th century BC. In early 597, Nebuchadnezzar, the King of the Babylonian Empire which had superseded that of Assyria, invaded Judah, and after a siege of 3 months captured Jerusalem (2 Kgs 24:10-17). King Jehoiachin, with his family, court officials, metal workers and men capable of bearing arms were led into exile in Babylon. The number is thought to have been between 8 and 10 thousand. Nebuchadnezzar then ransacked the Temple and the palace of their treasures, but left the city relatively intact. He appointed Jehoiachin's uncle, Zedekiah, as king. In 589, Zedekiah formed an alliance with Hophra (Pharaoh of Egypt) and rebelled against Babylon. Nebuchadnezzar laid siege to Jerusalem a second time, and took it in 587. Zedekiah was led away with about 832 deportees. The city, with its Temple and walls, was destroyed, and the Kingdom of Judah became part of the Babylonian province of Samaria. The land was also plundered by its neighbours - the Edomites to the south-east and the Ammonites to the west. However there was no importation of foreigners as happened after the fall of Northern Kingdom in 721.

Life in Babylon

Not all of the exiles to Babylon were enslaved: some even began to play an active part in the life and economy of their new homeland. They adapted to their new situation and to the religious practices of their neighbours, and so "circumcision and sabbath observance became their source of identity" (New Jerome Biblical Commentary).

A Glimmer of Hope

The prophet Jeremiah – who had been a severe critic of the monarchy and the Temple cult before the exile had predicted the deportations, but now he became a prophet of hope. He saw the exile as a remedial period, and predicted that the Lord would restore, not only those deported to Babylon, but also the exiles of the northern kingdom (Jer 30-33). A New Covenant would be inaugurated between Yahweh and the people (Jer 3131-34).

This hope was repeated by Ezekiel – the prophet who had lived with the exiles in Babylon (Ezk 33–39). It would also be proclaimed jubilantly by another, unnamed, prophet (Is 40-55) in the mid-6th century BC.

When Cyrus, the Persian king, captured Babylon in 539 BC, he issued a decree that allowed the exiles to return to Judea and rebuild the city of Jerusalem.



Summary

Those deported from the Northern Kingdom to Assyria would never return.

Not all of the exiles to Babylon were enslaved; some even began to play an active part in the life and economy of their new homeland.

SUNDAY LETTER

Series: Scripture; Fourth Sunday of Lent, Year B; 10 Mar 2024

The formation of the Bible as we have it today was hugely influenced by two deportations of the Hebrew people, but only one return. The first of the deportations took place in the 8th century BC when the Assyrian King, Tiglath-Pileser, invaded the northern kingdom of Israel and deported much of the population (2 Kgs 15:29-30). This invasion culminated in the fall of Samaria in 721 BC. It also involved the deportation of some 27,290 people to an area around Haran in northern Mesopotamia, some 750 km from their homeland (1

Amos and Hosea, two prophets of Israel (the northern kingdom), had prophesied the demise of Israel because of its worship of the Canaanite gods, Baal and Astarte, their infidelity to the Lord (the God of Israel) and their exploitation of the poor who were jealously protected by the



These deported people would never return, and the Assyrians replaced them in Israel with peoples from other parts of their empire. Thus the Hebrew ethnicity and religion became diluted and the land became known as "Galilee of the nations" (Is 9:1).

Although not all the Hebrew people were deported, those left behind became associated with the foreigners who had been planted among them, and so were looked down upon by the inhabitants of Judea, the southern kingdom.

The Second Deportation

The second deportation, and the return which followed, is much more significant for the formation
