Patrick's heart must have been beating loud in his chest as his ship approached the shores of Ireland for the second time. He must have relived the memories of his capture and enslavement as a teenager. But he could not be stopped.

Patrick was, in fact, part of a broader movement by the church in Gaul (what today we call "France") and particularly by the church in Auxerre, a city in the centre of Gaul which had recently sent preachers to the Christians of Britain also.

#### **Christian Evangelisation**


And so we read of new names in the history of Ireland: Secundinus in Meath, Auxilius and Iseminus in north Leinster, and Patrick's first successor as bishop in Armagh, Benignus. These foreign, Latin, names speak of the desire of the Christians in continental Europe that the Irish should be blessed with the Good News, just as they themselves had been blessed. And the Irish, especially when taught by Patrick, responded to this Good News with joy and fervour.

#### **His Humility**

The other characteristic of Patrick, found in his "Confessions", was his humility. Even to the modern reader, Patrick's willingness to speak, without fear, of all the great things that God had done through him,

- his call to become a missionary.
- his recounting of the personal stories of his converts;
- the miracle he saw in his own release from slavery.

None of these would have been possible in a selfimportant man. But Patrick had the essence of authentic Christian virtue: a deep humility coupled with an unstoppable courage. And so we can see what gave him that success: he preached the Gospel, but he had first been completely changed by it.



#### Summary

The Irish, when taught by Patrick, responded to the Good News with joy and fervour. Patrick had the essence of authentic Christian virtue, a deep humility coupled with an unstoppable courage.


Series: The Saints; St Patrick, Year B; 17 March

If there's one line that shows what a brilliant missionary St Patrick was, it is found in his "Confessions", "When I baptised so

many thousands of people."

Patrick was certainly one of the most effective missionaries of the Church's first 2000 years. Considering that Ireland, in his day, had only a small population, scattered among woods and bogs and without any cities, these thousands that he received into the Catholic faith must have been a game-changer in the entire culture of the Irish people. Patrick wrote at that time,

"I am very much a debtor to God, who has given me so much grace that many people should be reborn in God by means of me, and afterwards confirmed, and that clergy everywhere should be ordained for them, for a people recently come to belief, whom the Lord has take up from the ends of the earth."



When Patrick returned to Ireland, it was a green-field site, largely pagan. Nevertheless he managed to build up a fully-fledged Christian Church. How can we account for such success? As a self-defence against some unknown authority, the saint, late in life, laid out all that he had done in writing.

For the reader of St Patrick's "Confessions" (his spiritual autobiography) two characteristics are striking.

#### His Courage

Why would this man, a civilised and privileged Roman citizen, want to come back to a barbarian people where he had once been enslaved and was likely to be imprisoned again? In fact, he was twice re-captured and imprisoned again, but released – whether by ransom or by grace.
